How To Make Water, Brushes, and Paint Do What You Want Them To Do

First things first...Learning About Our Supplies

It's important to understand how the quality of materials can affect your painting efforts and results. My supply list contains the recommended products that are proven, through experience, to give the best results.

Paint

I always recommend Artist Grade paints because they contain more pigment and that results in more vibrant color. Student Grade paint contains less pigment but more binders and fillers. The differences between Artist Grade and Student Grade paints are definitely noticeable.

Paper

Through experience, I found that Arches Watercolor Paper is my preference. Paper is an important part of the painting. Working with a lower quality paper can be maddening. You will have some frustrating experiences that will make it easy to just give up painting altogether. This I know because I have experienced frustration and disappointment from using lower grade watercolor paper. I only use the lower grade paper now to test a color mixture or to practice brushstrokes and techniques. Remember...paper is an important part of the painting.

Brushes

As with anything, doing the best job requires using the best tools. I beg you...do not buy poor quality brushes. With the synthetic brushes available these days, you can get a good brush without breaking the bank. You will find them to be reasonably priced, plus the good ones will perform well. The brushes I am suggesting for this class are good and reasonably priced.

If you want the absolute best watercolor brushes, buy sable. There are several kinds of sable, all of which are of excellent hair. If you want the absolute best, buy Kolinsky Sable. It is the best of the best. Of course, they are more expensive!

In addition to sable, there are other types of natural brush hair such as badger, goat and squirrel, just to name a few.

The overall quality of the brush itself lies in the construction of the ferrule, the handle, and the type of hair that's used. The overall quality of the painting performance lies in the brush hair.

Just don't buy the cheapest brushes. They do not perform well. And, if they don't perform well, neither will you.

Brushes, when well cared for, will last for years. I have brushes that I bought when I was 18 years old, and after all these years they still perform well. A good brush is a good investment.
